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


Principals Report

Professional Learning

• Term 1


This term teachers at GRC Oatley have spent their professional learning time developing a Performance Development Process. The overarching purpose of the performance and development process is to support the ongoing improvement of student outcomes through continuous development of

skilled, effective and professional teachers. Teaching is enhanced when teachers are provided with positive encouragement to reflect on their practice, and benefit from regular feedback and professional development throughout the year. Teachers at GRC Oatley will observe one another as part of this process in order to stimulate discussions on the complexities and subtleties of making a difference in the classroom. Congratulations to the staff for a successful term.

• Term 2

Professional Learning in Term 2 will focus specifically on "What makes a difference in the Classroom?" This is some of the research that is behind what we are doing. Professor John Hattie, one of the world's leading educational researchers, has spent many years trying to determine the factors that have the biggest impact on student success. His findings are as follows:





In summary:

- Students: Around 50% of student achievement is attributed to what students bring to their learning themselves and this is more influential than any other variable. Their personal skills, attitudes, interests, knowledge and ability are the biggest influence on how well they achieve.
- Teachers: Account for about 30% of the variance in student achievement. It is what teachers know, do, and care about which is very powerful.
- The other areas of influence on student success are the Home, Peers, School and the **Principal**. While very important and essential each of these areas contributes about 5-10% up to a total of 20% of the influence on student success.

Teachers at GRC Oatley do an outstanding job of teaching and supporting all our students to achieve their personal best in learning in all areas of the curriculum. They are prepared to keep learning and step out of their comfort zone in order to perfect their craft. Student achievement is always at the forefront of our discussions.

Year 12 Exams

Our Year 12 exam period went smoothly. The exam period is very important as it allows Year 12 time to reflect on the topics they have studied and put this knowledge into practice. Congratulations Year 12 for your behaviour and focus during this time.

LIBRARY REPORT



THE LEARNING AND RESOURCE CENTRE at GRC OATLEY:

The students at Oatley Senior Campus have access to some of the best resources available to anyone in the state. The Library facilitates this. We prefer to be known as "The Learning and Resource Centre".

There are 20 computers readily available in the Library. Every student in the school by now should have a computer log-on. That password will now provide access to most digital applications and printing.

Students are issued with ID cards, which contain all relevant information for the HSC entrance, and which act as Library Borrowing cards. These cards also can have money loaded on to them for photocopying.

However, printing requires the purchase of a PaperCut voucher from the Office on Level 3, usually in \$5 lots. Library staff can assist with loading the voucher on to Network accounts.

All students are issued with textbooks, in most subjects, through the Library. That process is faster with the ID cards.

All students can borrow any resources available to them, within reason. For example, if an English student wanted to borrow a study guide on every text being taught in their course, they could do so – but not more than two on any one text. The usual loan period is 2 weeks.

Our new Library system, 'Oliver', is user-friendly and accessible from home. Students can create resource lists, reserve books themselves, and utilise the quick links that are embedded for Clickview and E Books. There will also soon be added features on the Oliver Home Page.

The Learning and Resource Centre on Level 2 includes:

- Teacher Librarians Mrs Caron Baumgartner and Mrs Elizabeth Love (Tuesdays), plus Support Staff Mrs Hazel Thomas and Mrs Vicki Johnson.
- Library services and 'troubleshooting' research and password issues.
- Focus on information and digital literacies.
- Computer access.
- Printing and photocopying facilities
- Classroom areas
- Private study cubicles
- Seminar Rooms for group work.
- Small Group study areas overlooking our 'lake'.
- The office of 'The Learning Centre' Support teacher, Ms Voula Alexiou.

- The Careers staff, Mrs Penny Morrison and Mrs Narelle Collins.
- The Counselling staff, Mr Rick Francis and Mrs Honny Henderson.



RESOURCES AVAILABLE:

GENERAL LIBRARY COLLECTION:

- A wide range of Fiction books, of varying levels and most genres.
- Carefully selected Picture Fiction used as supplementary materials in English, and for Visual Literacy.
- Graphic Novels, both Fiction and Non Fiction.
- Non Fiction titles that cover most general areas, and specifically cover HSC topics and areas of interest for students doing major works or extension courses.
 Even 'Reference' books are borrowable.
- Study Guides for all courses, generally held in multiples.
- Topical and pertinent Magazines and Periodicals, and Media Reviews.
- A large selection of DVDs, and some CDs.
- · Careers literature and books.
- Cameras and other AV equipment.

TEXTBOOK RESOURCES:

- Textbooks, some with or without discs and/or web-based support materials, are available for most subjects, for a year.
- TAFE textbook resources.

CLICKVIEW and CLICKVIEW ONLINE:

- The school holds a very large Clickview Teaching and Learning Library. There are about 7000 'video' titles, many of them commercially-produced up-to-date teaching videos. There are also about 2000 locally-added files – programs, films, series, etc. captured from television. They come across like a YouTube video file.
- The entire Clickview Library can be accessed from school via Clickview Player (a 'Shortcut' on the desktop) and also from the web-based Clickview Online. The system is designed for saturated use,

- anytime, anywhere. Multiple devices can be enabled (see Clickview Website).
- All students can view Clickview programs when needed, using their DET credentials. Search <u>clickviewonline.com.au</u>; User Name is the student's email address > 'Single Sign On School' and > Georges River College, Oatley Senior Campus.
- Clickview programs can be utilised for revision, research and catch-up lessons.

E BOOKS:

- Soon, we will have an E Book Collection, embedded into our Oliver Homepage. We are choosing titles now. It is anticipated that some of the recommended reading for English will be available via this platform.
- This will bring the added flexibility of digital access, from any internet connection, across several devices.

ENGINNERING STUDIES – 2015 RESULTS

Congratulations to the 2015 year 12 Engineering Studies class. The students in this cohort were committed to their studies and their hard work has paid off. Their HSC results were above state average by 1.49%. A tremendous effort by all. Six out of the eight students are now studying Engineering at UTS, Wollongong & TAFE.

Their success is contributed firstly to their hard work throughout the course. Secondly, incorporating theoretical with practical hands on work in class, using actual testing equipment allowed students to view the cell microstructures of the materials before and after testing. This equipment is used by engineers such as a Tensile Tester, Bending Tester, Shear Tester, Hardness Tester, Specimen Preparation and Polishing, Microscopes both traditional and modern USB models.

We were fortunate to have this equipment donated by the Industrial Arts departments from GRC Hurstville and GRC Peakhurst Campuses as they no longer had use for it. As an Engineering Science teacher, my aim was to bring the real world into the classroom. I created an Engineering Studies Learning Wall in the back of my classroom to help students consolidate their learning. This is an interactive wall which makes reference to the syllabus and once students completed their practical work, they were given the opportunity to display it under the relevant topic.



Excursions included visits to The University of Wollongong Engineering Day where students spent the entire day participating in introductory courses designed by the university engineering department to give students a taste of the various facets of Engineering.



The Bridges excursion consisted of visits to The Sydney Harbour Bridge, The Anzac Bridge and the decommissioned Glebe Island Bridge. This experience exposed students to the scope of each structure and the building material used throughout the decades to construct these bridges.

Students were then asked to put this learning experience into practice by designing a miniature scaled bridge in class made from balsa wood. Each bridge was then individually tested to see how much weight it could withhold. The winning design was a truss bridge which carried a total 34 kilograms over a span of 600mm. The total weight of the balsa wood bridge was 120 grams. This bridge design carried 284 times its own weight.

The aeronautical unit allowed students to learn about aircrafts. Their task was to make model planes from paper / cardboard and then recreate their design using balsa wood. Aircrafts were tested in a Wind Tunnel designed by the class using photocopier boxes and a fan.

Overall the students throughout the course worked as a team. No opportunity was wasted. They supported each other throughout the learning process and their results truly do reflect this.

I am very proud of these students and I wish them all the best in their future careers.
