A massive congratulations must also go to Huiyu Eva Zhang who was awarded 'Best Debater' overall. This was a great achievement as 384 students from 28 schools competed in the competition.





Debating and Public Speaking

GRC Oatley has been busy constructing arguments and putting forth ideas for their participation in the Year 11 Metro Premier's debating challenge. GRC Oatley debated Sydney Girls High School on the topic of cheerleading and should it be banned from sport.

GRC Oatley were the affirmative and constructed a strong model that proposed banning cheerleading from professional and commercial sports arguing that there are alternative ways that this sport can be celebrated and displayed. They also spoke about the negative impact cheerleading can have on sexualisation of women and rape culture. Although they constructed a strong case, Sydney Girls demonstrated that cheerleading itself is a valuable skill and sport in its own right and that commercial and professional sport enabled strong earnings for cheerleading. They also disagreed that cheerleading sexualised women but rather argued that cheerleading empowered women.

Sydney Girls arguments won the debate but special mention needs to be made of Rithysak Yous and Brain Hwang who participated in their first competition debate and spoke so clearly and eloquently. I also want to thank Laura Bancroft and Jack Appleby who were participants in all our debates and contributed so helpfully to our Tuesday afternoon practice sessions.



GRC Oatley also participated in the Plain English Speaking competition. Laura Bancroft and Ella-Rose Liasides competed with other delegates from our region at GRC Peakhurst Campus. Laura spoke passionately on language and its impact on rape culture, Ella-Rose cleverly questioned the assumption of choice bringing greater happiness yet also acknowledged the benefits that the choice of wealth brings. Both girls delivered an impromptu speech on the greatest human vice. Congratulations to both Laura and Ella who have excellent skills in conceptual thinking and constructing argumentation on their feet.

Laura successfully advanced to the Regional finals where she competed against schools across Sydney's southern and eastern suburbs. She was able to deliver again her prepared speech on language and rape culture and her impromptu topic was after the storm. Laura was unsuccessful in reaching State finals but we congratulate Laura on her achievements in Public Speaking and Debating this year.

Visual Arts Excursion to the Sydney Biennale at Cockatoo Island 5/6/18

GRC Oatley Visual Art students experienced the latest contemporary artworks close up and have gained a deeper appreciation and understanding of the post-modern world, which was obviously exhausting.
