STEM at OATLEY

STEM education is the learning of science, technology, engineering and mathematics in an interdisciplinary or integrated approach.



Students gain and apply knowledge, deepen their understanding and develop creative and critical thinking skills within an authentic context.

STEM Share is a new initiative being implemented by the Information Technologies Directorate. STEM Share is a \$23 million project allowing students to access the latest technologies in their classroom. The program will see the introduction of STEM Share kits to each principal network in NSW.

The STEM Share kits arrived at GRC Oatley in week 8 of term 2. This was for a showcase presentation to the network of Information and Technology Coordinators.

The onsite presentation also involved TAS students studying; Industrial Technology, Design Technology and Textile Technology.

Students mixed with the teacher coordinators to explore the kits; virtual reality, 3D printing, filmmaking and robotics experiences.

Be Connected at Mortdale Community Centre – Year 11 Software Design and Development

During the recent July school holidays, students from Year 11 Software Design and Development volunteered to help train older Australians in using the *Be Connected* website. The program was organised through the Mortdale Community Centre with small groups of older Australians attending. The older Australians registered to attend on either a Tuesday or a Thursday and returned the following week to continue the program and ask any questions they may have when trying to apply what they learnt at home.

Be Connected, is an Australian government initiative to increase the confidence, skills and online safety of older Australians and aims to empower everyone to use the internet and technology in this digital world. The program consisted of written lessons, videos and online quizzes that participants needed to complete. The content ranged from strategies to being safer while online, how tablets and smart phone work, to how to use social media and online shopping using services including PayPal.

While social and ethical issues are studied in class, it allowed the students to experience how people in the community can be disengaged with digital technology. Students were encouraged to act as mentors in supporting the participants. Students often helped setup social media accounts including Facebook and Instagram on the participant's smart phones and helped send out friend requests to family and friends.

The students did an amazing job engaging with the older Australians and the program. After speaking with both the participants and Mortdale Community Centre, the feedback was really positive with the students having made a real impact on their lives. One of the participants will be travelling to China later this year and is excited about posting photos of her trip to Instagram so that friends and family can share in her experience, something she said she wouldn't have tried without doing the program and the encouragement of the students.
