wind, for surely it must have carried itself home on the road back, for surely they must have felt the world pass them all by and leave them to melt away into dust.

But they did not see the end, the stars shattering overhead into twisting fragments, they were not smothered in the unremitting brutality, they did not tear open the sky with their claws and rip the beauty of life to shreds with their bayonets, they let the end come and go without a word—how could we ever return to such a life? How could we wander at night without senselessly fighting our own shadows? How could we live, day-by-day, without Death's weary and calloused hand on our shoulder? HSC and preliminary students attended Abdul's talk and portrait workshop. The day focused on Abdul's cultural art practice and the technicalities of the Portraiture genre.

Abdullah is a seventh-generation Australian Muslim whose work addresses the politicisation of Muslim identity within mainstream Australian culture. Working across portraiture, photography and painting, Abdullah uses his experience of growing up Muslim in the suburbs of Perth and coming of age in a post-September 11 world, to expose the prejudices and stereotypes which have demonised and marginalised Muslim youth today.

Abdullah's work is included in numerous exhibitions both nationally and internationally,

The day was a resounding success, students responding to Abdul's warm personality, highly informative talk on cultural identity and entertaining portrait workshop.

## The Wellbeing Hub

Hello from the SSO!

You may be wondering what SSO stands for; well, it is Student Support Officer!

My name is Petrina Hennessey and my role involves working with the school community, including students, parents, and school staff, as well as community organisations and the wider community, to support student well-being.

My goal as an SSO is to work alongside students to promote safety, resilience and pro-social behaviours, as well as being a point of call for students to seek advice, guidance, and support. It comprises working with student's one on one, and in small groups. Students can self-refer and may be referred by the Learning Support Team / Wellbeing team, Year Advisers, Head Teachers, Deputy Principal and Principal.

A student might be referred to me for support in areas such as bullying, developing self-esteem, resilience, conflict resolution and coping skills, peer mediation, or to be connected to local external support and youth services.

For more complex issues, referral to the Head Teacher Wellbeing, Principal or School Counsellor/school psychologist is the most appropriate course of action.

I do not provide psychological or intellectual, emotional or behavioural assessments with students. These are the responsibilities of the School Counsellor/ school psychologist. However, I am part of the Wellbeing team at the school who can help provide wrap-around support for these students.

## The Learning Hub

### THE LIBRARY GUIDE, for Parents of GRC Senior Students:

The GRC Oatley Library is open for students every day, from at least 8.30am-4.00pm (Except on Thursdays – 3.00pm & Fridays - 2.00 pm).

There are flexible learning spaces, including interactive screens, facility for group work as well as individual study, plus Seminar Rooms. All students have access to computers, printers, photocopying, and a vast array of



borrowable resources (books, textbooks, Clickview, study guides, magazines, DVD's etc).

There are also a number of staff members available within the Library Learning Hub space: Teacher Librarian, Head Teacher Learning Support, Learning Support teachers, Career Advisor, Transition Advisor and Youth Workers.



Many of our senior students choose to spend all of their spare time in the Library, making the best use of the facilities (and support services), and enjoying time with friends. Some dutifully study, every afternoon. There is an active cohort who enjoy playing Minecraft Edu. and a Geography application utilising Google Maps. Some just sit and read, especially around the Graphic Text area. We have had groups being shown how to knit, crochet, do Origami and use Mindcraft. This modern facility has been set-up to cater to the needs of all students.

Our students come regularly to the Library Learning Hub to simply work on assignments and assessments, and to seek assistance with research. At our busiest times, we can have well over 150 students in the Library. There are 30 computers readily available. The core values of Respect, Responsibility and Aiming for Excellence are well-established in the Library Learning Hub spaces. Whenever students are in the Library, it is understood that the teaching and learning being undertaken is happening with respect for others.



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
